

This month's kindergarten topics include pronouns, parts of the body and emotions. GRADE-LEVEL NEWS

PRE-K

Pre-k students continue to show kindness as we learn friendly and helpful behaviors! We have learned how to be problem-solvers using our Solution Suitcase! Prekindergarten friends are building reading skills by learning sight words, using picture clues, and answering WH questions. Pre-k mathematicians have been talking about shapes and their attributes, sorting, and counting/comparing groups to determine more/equal/fewer. We are looking forward to building fine motor skills by creating a variety of holiday crafts this month!

KINDERGARTEN

We are working hard to master skills in Kindergarten! We can identify all letters and are mastering sounds now. We are using these sounds to read and write CVC (consonant, vowel, consonant) pattern words with the short vowel sounds. We are using sight words and our letter sounds to read and write sentences in good form. In math we continue to use mathematical tools and strategies to problem solve. Please help your child become a fluent reader with good comprehension by reading and discussing stories for at least fifteen minutes every day. Can your child find sight words in the story? Make two sets of sight word flash cards and play Memory for a fun way to master sight words! Thank you for sending Prepared Pandas every day!

1st

Phonics: We are working on digraphs, r-controlled vowels, and blends.

<u>Reading/Writing</u>: We started a unit about Being a Good Citizen. We will write an informational step by step book.

<u>Math</u>: We are working on addition, subtraction and the strategies to help with fluency. <u>Social Studies:</u> We will learn about the state of Maryland as being a part of a community.

2nd

Our second graders are working hard to reach their goals! In phonics, students will continue blending and spelling words with long vowel sounds. Students will learn more long vowel spelling patters and silent letters in upcoming lessons. In reading, students read a variety of narrative texts that include fairy tales and fables as they explore the essential question: What lesson can we learn from the characters in stories? Students will also finish writing opinion essays and move onto writing narratives. They will create an imaginative story to show their understanding of the key parts of narratives. In math, students will be working through Unit 3 which focuses extending knowledge of place value by applying strategies for multi-digit addition and subtraction with up to three-digit numbers. In number corner, students will learn about shapes and their attributes. They will make predictions and find patterns to classify shapes and find lines of symmetry. In addition, students will organize and read data from graphs. Second

graders are helping to solve a problem in science in our Building Blocks unit. They are acting as structural engineers to explore the properties of materials in order to determine the mixture that will best support a retaining wall. We will continue to read aloud books that celebrate the season. Second grade will also enjoy a craft on Wednesday, December 20th, prior to the winter break.

3rd

Third graders are rapidly expanding their reading, writing, and math skills at an alarming speed. Currently, third graders are adding and subtracting multi-digit equations to a point where some of it is now able to be completed mentally! WOW!! In reading, third graders just wrapped up learning about influential documents, symbols, monuments, and holiday that represent our nation and are crafting an expository essay in order to teach others. For content, third graders just wrapped their civics unit and learned all about their three branches of government and the leaders at each level. Third graders are now embarking in their new health unit called "Healthy Relationships" and review everything from peer pressure to tattling vs. telling. Third grade recess has been restructured to ensure everyone is safe and socially happy! The third-grade teachers are happy to announce that their field trip planning has commenced and will be announced soon! Third grade teachers are in desperate need of tissues, hand sanitizer, desk wipes, chalk, jump ropes or any recess equipment you may have laying around! Thank you so much for all of your continued support!

4th

We loved seeing so many of you during American Education week and enjoyed meeting with you on Conference Day. If you have a chance, come check out our "Gifts to the World" display in the front hallway for the month of December! Our students wrote about a hypothetical gift they would give to the world this holiday season. In reading this coming month, we will be reading a variety of stories and asking ourselves, "What makes someone a hero?" Be sure to ask your student about what we are reading about in school! Please also make sure your students are reading each night and turning in their bookmarks for the end of the year Kona Ice celebration from the PTA! As always, we are appreciative of any donations of tissues and dry erase markers. Wishing you a wonderful holiday season and a happy new year!

5th

This December, 5th graders are working on their DBQ (document-based questioning) where they will enhance their essay writing skills to prepare them for middle school and beyond. At completion, they will begin their first Social Studies Unit: Colonial Regions. During this unit, students will learn about how colonial regions affected the economy and the lives of colonists. In Reading, students have been learning about the Wild West and its significance to the growth of America. Students have been especially interested in this topic and have enjoyed hearing first-person accounts and deepening their vocabulary understanding. Two of our 5th grade math classes are continuing Math Unit 3, Place Value and Decimals, whereas our third 5th grade class will be working with ratios. Our students are excelling in all areas of math and we are excited to continue challenging them!

Ms. Koumides' ISDM Class

During the month of December, our ELA centers will be reviewing the question, "How can I be my healthiest me?" We will introduce and explore everyday habits and the essentials of healthy living. In Phonics. we will continue focusing on letter sounds and sight words. Our Math centers will continue working on counting, less and more, and exploring addition/subtraction. In SEL, we will hone in on calming strategies and self regulating our emotions.

Ms. Ryan's ISDM Primary Class

In December, we will be continuing our work on Community Heroes and focusing on our essential question "what makes a community?" In ELA, we will be reading about different communities in order to make and check predictions about our texts, as well as identify the theme and supporting details throughout. In Math, we are working on addition and subtraction up to 10, and in SEL we are focusing on giving back to our community.

This month, library students in grades K-3 as well as our ISDM students, will partner up with Mrs. Ebersole in Makerspace to travel around the world in order to learn about different holidays celebrated in other countries. Students in grades 4 and 5 will continue to identify award winning books in order to help them understand what makes us enjoy reading. MAKERSPACE

In December, we will be collaborating with Library to learn about different holidays around the world. In Makerspace, we will focus on Diwali, Kwanzaa and the Lunar New Year. We will learn about customs and traditions, read stories and build a craft/activity related to these holidays. Students will also receive a passport to take home at the end of the month to show the holidays covered.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

During the month of November, students worked on striking skills by participating in Pillo Polo/Floor Hockey drills and skills. 4th and 5th grades will continue to practice Fitness-gram curlups, push-ups and increasing endurance for the Pacer assessment.

In the Month of December students will be participating in the Movement Education Equipment (M.E.E.). This unit provides students with physical, social, emotional, and intellectual benefits. The obstacle course challenges students through a series of movement experiences. Students will be given the opportunity to solve individual and group tasks, to gain self-confidence and self-esteem, to socialize in cooperative settings, to develop physically, and to have FUN!

VOCAL MUSIC

Students in Mr. Pugh's Vocal Music class have been learning to identify line and space notes on a staff. They've used mnemonic devices to help them remember where to properly place given notes. Later on this month, we will be learning more about dynamics in music and tempo!

The 5^{th} grade students are preparing for their Winter concert which will be held on Thursday, December 7^{th} at 6pm along with Band and Orchestra.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

Students in 4th grade will complete their study of the string orchestra and begin learning about the brass family.

Students in 5th grade will prepare and present the Winter Concert. The concert is on Thursday, December 7th at 6 PM. Students should arrive at 5:30 p.m. dressed nicely. (No jeans, t-shirts or jeans if possible.) The concert should last about 45 minutes.

SPANISH

5th Grade Spanish:

Students will be working on our end of unit projects. They are completing an "application" for a game show in which they must describe themselves and their family members in Spanish. They can discuss physical appearance, personality, relationships and likes or dislikes. At the end of the month, we will complete our required end of unit assessment in Schoology.

4th Grade Spanish:

We will begin our second unit "Mi Familia Moderna" (My Modern Family). We will the following vocabulary: family/relationships, favorite activities, likes and dislikes, personality traits and pets. As always, throughout the unit, we will work on developing our listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in the target language.
